Building knowledge flows on the road: the inspiration bus trip Marleen Gysen and Tom Schaeken, Boerenbond

The European Horizon 2020 project HyPErFarm has one main goal: to sharply reduce the use of fossil fuel in farming. To achieve this goal of de-carbonisation, the project actively looks for business cases farmers might adopt that help them reduce their use of fossil fuels and find economic gain. The HYPErFArm inspiration bus trip to agrivoltaics and biochar sites in Belgium, Germany and the Netherlands is intended to accelerate the

research and innovation work on agrivoltaics, resulting in successful farmer and citizen-oriented cost effective agrivoltaic projects. This example aims to demonstrate how key stakeholders and end-users (farmers, researchers, consultants, policy makers or supporters, technology providers) can be successfully engaged in innovative processes.



Linking research to practice: the Speeding Up Innovation event series Florian Herzog, Austrian Chamber of Agriculture

Speeding Up Innovation is an event-series for AKIS (Agricultural knowledge and innovationsystem)-networking, jointly organized by the agricultural ministry (research department) and the chamber of agriculture (advisory branch) in Austria. The event aims to develop and accelerate the transfer of

knowledge between research and practice in specific thematic areas on the basis of selected examples of research projects. Speeding Up Innovation further aims to initiate a dialogue and discussion on effective knowledge transfer instruments. Another focus is on networking of representatives from national research institutions with agricultural advisory, training and education service providers. This presentation will show a successful implementation of an instrument for fostering knowledge flows in practice.



Bringing new knowledge to practice: the Latvian demonstration farms Kaspars Žūriņš. Latvian Advisory and Training Centre

The Ministry of Agriculture in Latvia announces the procurement of agricultural and forestry demonstrations. Both public and private consultants, as well as scientific institutions, can apply. The purpose of the event is to ensure the installation and implementation of a demonstration

that practically demonstrates or demonstrably demonstrates the advantages of a new agro-technical technique, technological process, crop or animal breed, which have been tested in research and reflect at least two variants - the existing standard technique and the new technique. Both consultants and owners are actively involved in the process. That is great opportunity for advisors to gain knowledge and to share knowledge with farmers, other advisors and researchers. The implications are Knowledge exchange and reducing fragmentation by including all AKIS actors in the initiative.
